



DiveTracker Scenarios

Here is when and how DiveTracker can benefit your dive

| Situation | Use & Benefit |
|----------------------------------------------------------|--------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| Limited visibility | Use DiveTracker to remain aware where you are, and return to the boat or exit point without surfacing for a compass bearing. |
| Deep diving | Mount the transmitter near the bottom of the anchor line. Find it to avoid a dangerous mid-water ascent. |
| Diving fast currents | Navigate to the boat while staying close to the seafloor where currents slow down. |
| Photo/Video and equipment test dives | Concentrate on your work. Use DiveTracker periodically to check your location and distance from the boat. |
| Diving with a student, a child, a less experienced buddy | Put the DiveTracker transmitter on your buddy – to not loose them like I did! |
| Diving in sharky waters | Use DiveTracker to hug the seafloor and stay out of the water column from descent to ascent. |
| Surviving an emergency | DiveTracker shows the way home, bringing coordination and calm back to your dive. |
| Salvage and survey dives | Use the DiveTracker transmitter to mark a specific site for a later return. |
| Under the ice diving | Drop a DiveTracker transmitter on a line through the hole. To find it at the end of your dive. |
| Diver recall | Lower a Sport Transmitter set to a fast ping repeat setting from the boat. Inform fast ping means return to boat. |
| Diver emergency alert | The diver carries a transmitter and turns it on in case of emergency. A special boat receiver with hull mounted transducer and audio alert is available to support this. |

Warning: DiveTracker can fail! Use it as an additional layer of safety. Never as your sole means for a safe dive!
